KEYNOTE ADDRESS

Subs, Soldiers and Scripts: How the Government-Entertainment Complex Works



Tricia Jenkins, Ph.D., is a Professor of Film, Television and Digital Media at Texas Christian University, where she teaches classes in media theory, television and film genres, world cinema, social identity, propaganda and the history of broadcasting.

As a researcher, Tricia earned her Ph.D. in American Studies from Michigan State University and now specializes in the US government's influence on film and television production. She is the author of three books and more than twenty scholarly articles. Her books include *The CIA and Hollywood: How the Agency Shapes Film and Television* (U of Texas P, 2012, 2016) and *Superheroes, Movies and the States: How the US Government Shapes Cinematic Universes* (UP of Kansas, 2022). Her writing has also appeared in or been cited in the LA Times, National Public Radio, the BBC World Service, The Washington Post, FOX and others. Mostly recently, she was featured in episodes 7 and 8 of the 2024 hit podcast, *Witnessed: Fade to Black*, by Sony Entertainment Media.

In addition to her scholarly pursuits, she serves as the chair of the board of the Fort Worth Film Commission and as a board member of the Lone Star Film Society. She is also the creator of her own award-winning podcast, *Worldwide: The Unchosen Church*, which explores life inside of the doomsday cult, The Worldwide Church of God.
